On August 25th, the VDH K-12 Testing Team held a **Back-to-School session** to review updated guidance and testing resources for schools. Schools are invited to view and share the <u>slide deck</u> and <u>recording</u> of the session.

Please note that VDH has updated the <u>Interim COVID-19 Isolation and Quarantine Guidance for K-12 schools</u> as of August 22nd, 2022. Test to Stay is no longer routinely recommended for K-12 schools.

VDOE Updates

 <u>2023 Virginia School Survey of Climate and Working Conditions</u> The purpose of this memorandum is to notify school divisions that the 2023 Virginia School Survey of Climate and Working Conditions will be administered to schools beginning January 9, 2023 and ending February 24, 2023.

• September is Attendance Awareness Month

School attendance is essential to academic success. Research shows that missing as little as two days every month, or ten percent of the school year, can have a significant impact on students. Almost half of students who miss between two and four days in September continue to be chronically absent throughout the school year.

- <u>Required Entrance Procedures and Criteria for Identifying Potential English Learners</u>
 The purpose of this memorandum is to communicate standardized entrance procedures and criteria for
 English Learner (EL) identification as required under the Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015 (ESSA)
- <u>School Meal Debt Cannot Limit Students' Extracurricular Participation</u> Legislation that prohibits school boards and school board employees from excluding students who owe school meal debt, or cannot pay for a school meal, from extracurricular school activities.

 <u>2023</u> United States Senate Youth Program (Scholarship Opportunities for High School Juniors and Seniors)

The VDOE will select two student delegates to represent Virginia in the United States Senate Youth Program (USSYP) sponsored by the William Randolph Hearst Foundation. Each delegate will receive a \$10,000 scholarship and an all-expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C.

• 2022 CTE High-Quality Work-Based Learning Guide

The VDOE collaborated with stakeholders to review and revise the CTE High-Quality Work-Based Learning Guide (HQWBL). Technical content revisions and new program content in certain areas was added to provide local school divisions with consistent messaging regarding high-quality work-based learning experiences. The Guide focuses on all 12 types of WBL methods used in Virginia. It includes Virginia regulations and guidelines for the administration of HQWBL and provides training materials for work-based learning teacher-coordinators.

• Implementation of Computer Science Instruction

During the 2016 session of the Virginia General Assembly, legislation was enacted to amend <u>22.1-</u> <u>253.13:1</u> of the Code of Virginia (Standard 1. Instructional programs supporting the Standards of Learning and other educational objectives) to include "computer science and computational thinking, including computer coding" into the Standards of Learning. The attached School Counselor FAQ document will support division and school leaders when constructing master schedules and ensure appropriately endorsed teachers are assigned to computer science standalone courses.

• Assessment Updates in Grade 3-8 Reading and Mathematics for 2022-2023

Unlike the fall 2021 growth assessments that focused on content from the student's previous grade level, beginning with the 2022-2023 school year, the fall and winter growth assessments will focus primarily on content from the student's current grade level.

• <u>Passing Scores Adopted by the Virginia Board of Education for the Virginia Alternate Assessment</u> <u>Program in Reading, Mathematics, and Science</u>

The Virginia Board of Education (Board) adopted passing scores for the Virginia Alternate Assessment Program (VAAP) tests in reading, mathematics, and science that were administered for the first time in spring 2022.

 <u>Requests from Division Superintendents to Modify the Licensure Regulations for School Personnel for</u> <u>School Counselors</u>

The VDOE continues to evaluate options to provide flexibility in meeting the requirements associated with licensing of instructional personnel, including school counselors. Recognizing that school counselors continue to be a critical shortage area, the Office of Licensure and School Leadership is considering requests from division superintendents who are seeking modifications to the Regulations for school counselor applicants who hold certain licenses issued by the Virginia Department of Health Professionals.

 <u>Promoting Social and Behavioral Success for Learning in Elementary Schools</u>, National Center for Education Evaluation and Regional Assistance Institute of Education Sciences Department of Education, March 2022

This report includes practice recommendations for educators drawn upon studies of whole-school or whole-class interventions that support prosocial behavior in elementary school students, including students who are identified as having disabilities or who are at risk of identification for special education services. This report offers elementary educators, administrators, qualified related service providers, and qualified school-based mental health practitioners five specific recommendations for prevention-focused practices that promote prosocial student behavior and related outcomes.

- <u>Getting it Right</u>, National Center for Education Evaluation and Regional Assistance Getting a student's name right is the first step in welcoming him or her to school. Staff members who work with student-level data also know the importance of accurately and consistently recording a student's name in order to track student data over time, match files across data sets, and make meaning from the data. This set of naming conventions reference guides can help you accurately enter students' names in school, district, and state databases. The guides are currently available for students with home languages of Arabic, Chinese, Hindi, Korean, Russian, Somali, Spanish, Tagalog, Ukrainian, Urdu, and Vietnamese.

• <u>Safe and Supportive Schools Conference</u>, Office of Student Services, Virginia Department of Education (VDOE)

This summer the Office of Student Services hosted the Safe and Supportive Schools Virtual Conference, Moving from Surviving to Thriving! All of the breakout sessions were recorded and are now available for you to view on the Virginia Career and Learning Center webpage!

• <u>Updating and Adapting the Cognitive Behavioral Intervention for Trauma in Schools (CBITS)</u>, Office of Student Services, VDOE

Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic and the social unrest following the death of George Floyd, students have increased exposure to trauma, and emotional and behavioral difficulties of students have intensified. The Cognitive Behavioral Intervention for Trauma in Schools (CBITS) is a widely utilized, evidence-based group treatment that has been adapted for use with students from various cultural backgrounds. Input from school staff members, parents, and clinicians in the Richmond, Virginia area was utilized to update and adapt the CBITS to reflect the cultural identities and experiences of local students. The modified intervention, the RVA CBITS Update, will be discussed and suggestions for implementing similar adaptations in other localities will be shared.

• Fostering More Vibrant Schools (Webinar), William & Mary

Learn about the Vibrant School Scale, created by a team of doctoral students in 2021. This scale helps identify existing vibrancy within schools while amplifying strengths. When school communities celebrate what's going well, it provides positive momentum to design and achieve future goals.

- <u>Managing Anxiety & The Return To School Webinar Series</u>, Mental Health Technology Transfer Center (funded by Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, SAMHSA) Anxiety is one of the most common mental health concerns youth face. While it is a normal emotional experience, it can grow to become incredibly distressing and interfering, particularly as it comes to school. When anxiety is present in the school setting (whether in-person or remote), educators have an important role in encouraging and reinforcing brave vs. anxious behavior. Research supports the importance of youth moving from a cycle of avoiding to a cycle of approaching anxiety-provoking situations in order to overcome problematic anxiety. In this recorded webinar series, participants will learn how to identify, understand, and intervene for problematic anxiety for youth in your classroom.
- <u>Provider Well-Being for Behavioral Health Providers</u>, Mental Health Technology Transfer Center (funded by SAMHSA)

Engages individual behavioral health providers in a private, self-paced course to assess and improve their personal well-being in five areas:

- Physical
- Occupational
- Intellectual

- o Social
- Emotional

The course consists of six chapters and ten lessons. Providers learn about the stages of change, the impact of stress on our minds and bodies, and a process to develop a self-care plan. Assessments throughout the lessons guide providers in selecting areas of focus and strategies that are most likely to be helpful. The assessments may be repeated over time to provide a measure of progress.

The DCJS, in collaboration with Safe & Sound Schools, announced this two-day training across Virginia. This training is designed for participants to attend both days consecutively, however participants are able to attend only one day if schedules will not allow them to attend both. • Free! Praesidium Safety Equation Prevention Training

Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU) is offering no cost online <u>Praesidium Safety</u> <u>Equation</u> prevention training to school districts for all school employees and school board members. This training is comprehensive and, for most staff, can be completed in about 25 minutes. Administrator training lasts up to 50 minutes. This training can be completed at any time between September 1, 2022 and September 30, 2023.

Training is part of a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention funded study on prevention of school employee sexual misconduct. As part of the study, all staff complete a 15 minute online survey before training and a year after training; selected school administrators are interviewed before training and a year after training. In addition to training, schools and school districts receive a risk assessment with recommendations tailored to the school or district for additional prevention practices. All data collected are protected by a Certificate of confidentiality. No data may be subpoenaed or used by others.
