Accurate Math Assessment: Informing System-wide Support

Data literacy matters. Mandinach and Gummer (2013) noted that the scope and nature of data in education is growing and with this growth in data, "all educators must understand how to use tangible evidence to inform their decisions rather than use anecdotes, intuitions, or personal preference" (p. 32).

Data literacy is not solely assessment literacy, but assessment literacy is a critical component of data literacy. All data collected within a school system (e.g., assessment data, fidelity data, etc.) is encompassed within data literacy.

Yet, many status quo support strategies can be cumbersome and disruptive for teachers, their students, and even those responsible for offering support. There's a more efficient, practical and effective way, and it is

empowering teachers to reflect with classroom video.

In our <u>latest piece for EdSurge</u> by Swivl CEO Brian Lamb, he outlines why reflection + video is both a rightnow solution to improve new teacher support and the first step towards turning schools into trust-based organizations.

One simple strategy capable of delivering high-impact results in this regard is the targeted use of classroom video. This approach helps teachers reflect deeply and hold evidence-based discussions with coaches and colleagues. And the effect is just as powerful when it comes to student learning. Reviewing classroom video, or what John Hattie calls "micro-teaching," is one of the strongest factors related to student achievement in <u>his list</u> of 250+ items.

Improved Methods of New Teacher Support

Providing adequate support for new teachers has long been a top priority for schools. Yet, many of the traditional strategies employed, while absolutely essential to professional growth, can be cumbersome and disruptive for teachers, their students and even those responsible for offering support.

Classroom walk-throughs and observations place undue stress on new teachers, eat into prep time and can exacerbate existing classroom management issues. School-wide PD often feels disconnected from a new teacher's work. Individual coaching can be a great addition to a district's PD plan, but this is a resource-intensive approach.

Each of these concerns presents an opportunity for more efficient, practical and effective professional learning for new teachers.

New teachers need to reflect on their practice

Reflection with video gives new teachers clear evidence to address their challenges, get help when needed and build the competencies required to avoid those challenges in the future. With video, a teacher can see the reasons behind their challenges and work toward real solutions. Recording an interaction with a rowdy class, for example, gives the teacher a chance to first observe their response and then share the recording with a colleague, coach or administrator to brainstorm ways to improve their classroom management skills.

The act of regular reflection, on its own, also helps new teachers develop the mental skills that can prevent classroom issues down the line. Building self-awareness positively impacts emotional intelligence, empathy, listening skills, critical-thinking skills, decision making, communication and leadership. When new teachers develop a strategic routine of self-reflection, they become drivers of positive change in their own classroom and, eventually, throughout their school or district.

Districts support new teachers through reflection and video

Consider how two separate districts have used video to support teaching and learning during the pandemic.

Facing a teacher shortage, <u>Littleton Elementary School District</u> had to hire many new teachers from outside of Arizona. This resulted in an unfavorable ratio of mentor teachers to early-career and new teachers. In response, the district created a robust system of teacher support based heavily on regular reflection and classroom video. New teachers get frequent support by sharing short videos with coaches through Teams by <u>Swivl</u>. This empowers district instructional coaches to provide more personalized feedback than may be possible when conducting in-person walkthroughs.

"Now, because principals have <u>Swivl Teams + Robot</u>, they can help a teacher who needs support and have them work on self-reflection," observes Aracely Vazquez, Littleton Educational Technology Specialist.

"Coaches can't be everywhere all the time to give teachers feedback," explains Littleton Director of Instructional Technology Jim Verrill. But the district has realized the time-saving benefits of supporting new teachers through classroom video capture with Swivl Robots, enhanced by reflection and discussion through Teams by Swivl. This addresses multiple pain points for Verrill: "There's no need to schedule a time to come into the classroom, and teachers receive lots of personalized feedback."

Kelley Clark, Professional Development Coordinator in Dodge City, Kansas, has also <u>leveraged reflection and</u> <u>classroom video</u> to support new teachers. She believes that this combination is not only time-saving, but also helps teachers develop autonomy.

"When the Swivl Robot is in the classroom, it's an objective observer," Kelley says. "Teachers look at what they're doing and how their kids are responding. That's more powerful than anyone coming in and saying, 'You should be doing this or that."

Building a trust-based organization

Classroom video as a tool for regular reflection provides some clear benefits: better, faster, more personalized support for new teachers. But when teachers gain the habit of reflection early in their career, acting as leaders to spread the practice to their colleagues, the possibilities expand dramatically.

Reflection through video can improve alignment around important initiatives. If teachers and administrators all reflect on the same classroom video, it becomes much easier to establish shared expectations for a new curriculum or culture shift.

In this way, regular reflection with video can promote trust across systems. First, teachers begin to trust in their own ability to identify challenges and improve their practices. Then, colleagues develop more trust in one other as they share their work and help each other improve. Ultimately, an entire organization can develop a culture of trust as everyone becomes more committed to shared goals and visions for success.

It all starts with giving new teachers the tools and support they need from day one.

Milanote: This user-friendly app for creative writers makes it easy to organize your ideas, research, outline, and characters all in one place. Milanote is great for writers who don't think and write in a linear progression.



LibreOffice: This free open-source word processor is a great alternative to Microsoft Office, especially for aspiring/starving writers on a budget. LibreOffice is functional and user-friendly. Plus, it's compatible with a wide range of file types like .doc, .docx, .xls, .xlsx, .ppt, and .pptx.

Evernote: Another option for writers who need a little help getting organized. The Evernote app lets you save online articles, write down thoughts, and even record audio notes — making it a great tool for those who are constantly getting new ideas on-the-go.

Ommwriter: The free web version of this app helps writers relax, think, and write by providing them with soothing background music, customizable keyboard sounds, and relaxing backgrounds. Basically, Ommwriter helps writers take a "break" from all the noise and distractions in life, so that they can focus on writing.

To Doist: As you might be able to guess by the name, the To Doist app helps people get organized by creating a to-do list of tasks that they need to get done. You can create daily or weekly to-do lists, as well as organize tasks by their level of importance.

Cold Turkey: For writers who need additional help ridding themselves of distractions, there's Cold Turkey. You can use the writing tool's free basic plan to eliminate distractions. For example, blocking certain websites and even certain computer programs for specified periods of time, so that you can focus 100% of your time and energy on writing.

Hemingway: The free app makes it easy for writers to write "boldly and clearly" with a number of helpful features. In addition to a word-counter, the Hemingway app also gives your content a readability score based on how readable your writing is. For example, it might suggest making changes to a complex sentence that's difficult to read. Essentially, this app really helps make your writing more engaging.

Grammarly: If you want to be a professional writer, then you must publish professional-looking content. That means your content must be free of spelling and grammar mistakes, as well as sentence structure errors. The free Grammarly app can scan your text looking for those hard-to-find typos that you accidentally overlook after hours of writing.

These statements are among the many annual goals set by veteran principals and their instructional leader teams for themselves and their faculty to improve building instructional outcomes. If you are a new principal, those are tangible goals to embrace with purpose. However, the daily and weekly crises often avert our attention away from the mission as we serve as reactive managers rushing to extinguish the urgent fires of the day. To create sustainable models of school improvement, leadership teams engaging in the process must make it an iterative process with teams consistently revisiting the planning, implementation, assessment, and re-implementation cycle (or whichever variation of an improvement cycle is used). Instructional Leader teams must come together to determine ways to effectively manage crises while protecting the sanctity of instructional leader activities.

On a personal level, I would consistently remind my leadership teams, "what you don't address, you bless, and; you cannot expect what you don't inspect." Teachers and students should see and feel the educational values and the focus of a leader's heart. That is done through both words and actions and, ultimately, is what brings others in line with the overall mission. As your team is planning and implementing plans for success, remember to keep in mind that the school improvement process is a "process" that takes time, and small progress each day adds up to big, sustainable results.

As customary, the Office of School Quality (OSQ), and other departments within the Virginia Department of Education (VDOE), stand ready to assist your team in any part of opening the school-year and navigating throughout the year as various needs arise. Support for High-Quality Educational Environments

Instructional Rounds are a structured process for schools and divisions to collect data and apply shared expertise to implement school improvement plans. In this process, networks of educators within a school, across schools in a division, or a division observe classroom instruction to identify the next level of work for school improvement related to a problem of practice. The next level of work reflects an area of discrepancy between the school's desired functioning and the current state. Schools use a cycle of inquiry based on student data to identify a problem of practice that focuses on the instructional core, the interaction of students, teachers, and content that drives learning. Observation teams use focus questions aligned to the problem of practice to guide their observations within the instructional network during an observation debrief. The debrief identifies areas of effective instruction for celebration and areas for improvement that inform the next level of work.

This <u>research brief from Hanover Research</u> reviews available literature on the definition and components of Instructional Rounds. In addition, this <u>supplement</u> provides tools for applying this content.

VDOE: Testing Memo No. 1546 Communicating Results of State Assessments to Parents/Guardians

The *Elementary and Secondary Education Act*, reauthorized as the *Every Student Succeeds Act* (ESSA) states that "... a school that receives (ESEA) funds...shall provide to each individual parent of a child who is a student in such school...information on the level of achievement and academic growth of the student, if applicable and available, on each of the State academic assessments...." [ESEA §1112(e)(1)(B)(i)] Additionally, §1111(b)(2)(B)(x) of ESSA requires that assessments used to meet federal assessment and accountability requirements "produce individual student interpretive, descriptive, and diagnostic reports... regarding achievement on such assessments that allow parents, teachers, principals, and other school leaders to understand and address the specific academic needs of students, and that are provided to parents, teachers, and school leaders, as soon as is practicable after the assessment is given...."

As previously communicated in Superintendent's Memo 282-17, school divisions are reminded that individual student score reports, or the information included on individual student score reports, are to be provided to parents or guardians of each student in a timely fashion after the completion of the test administration. Beginning in fall 2021, the Virginia Department of Education made available for families Virginia's Assessment Parent Portal. School divisions must provide families with some student demographic information and a claim code in order for parents to access the portal. Access to the portal will allow families to access certain Standards of Learning and Growth Assessment score reports for their child(ren). Each Division Director of Testing has been provided with information on the use of the parent portal.

In addition, at the end of each state test administration, school divisions have the opportunity to order printed copies of individual student score reports at no cost to the school division as part of the statewide assessment contract. This includes student score reports for Standards of Learning tests, Virginia Alternate Assessment Program tests, and Fall and Winter Growth Assessments. Each Division Director of Testing has been provided with details of how to access and order individual student score reports.

Superintendent of Public Instruction's Statement on National Reading and Math Report

RICHMOND — Superintendent of Public Instruction Jillian Balow issued the following statement today in response to the release of <u>National Assessment of Educational Progress long-term trend reading and mathematics</u> <u>data</u> by the National Center for Education Statistics.

"The NAEP long-term trend report provides our first national picture of the catastrophic consequences for students of the pandemic and the prolonged closure of schools to in-person learning.

"While we won't have state-level NAEP data until later this fall, it is reasonable to expect that the performance of Virginia students — which began to decline well before the pandemic — will mirror the national trends in reading and math, especially given how long our students and teachers were kept out of their classrooms.

"Governor Glenn Youngkin, Secretary of Education Aimee Guidera and I are committed to the recovery of every student in every school. The announcement of the <u>Bridging the Gap</u> initiative yesterday represents our first step toward meeting this unprecedented challenge.

"Working in partnership with parents and teachers, we will bridge the gap and create a culture of excellence and high expectations in every school in the commonwealth."





<u>Four takeaways from Virginia's post-pandemic standardized test results</u>, Virginia Mercury, 8/29/22 ... Education officials in Virginia have made addressing the student achievement gap a top priority in Virginia after standardized test results showed statewide declines. Virginia's pass rates, which are calculated from the Standards of Learning and Virginia Alternate Assessment Program tests, showed that all students performed better in 2021-22, when districts had returned to in-person learning, compared to the prior year.

<u>Growing number of Virginia colleges waiving SAT and ACT test requirements</u>, Richmond Times-Dispatch, 8/27/22 ... In March 2020, James River High School junior Irelyn Rogan didn't know if she should sign up for the SAT as schools abruptly closed because of the pandemic and classes shifted to being online and from home. Having taken the PSAT and not received a score that reflected her grades, Rogan decided not to sit for the standardized exam widely used in college admissions. Between the cost, stress and test anxiety, Rogan decided the best thing was to apply to colleges without a test score. Now a sophomore at Virginia Commonwealth University studying elementary education, Rogan stands by her decision in opting out of college entrance exams.

<u>Youngkin outlines steps to address teacher shortage in executive directive</u>, Virginia Mercury, 9/1/22 ... Glenn Youngkin signed an executive directive on Thursday that aims to address teacher shortages in Virginia through strategies that include hiring retired educators and targeting recruitment and retention efforts toward communities most in need. His directive comes as the nation and Virginia face shortages of teachers due to such possible causes as highly charged political battles over education, the pandemic and dissatisfaction with wages.

THE WASHINGTON POST: Va. governor eases path to teaching

At a ceremony held at Stafford County's Colonial Forge High School, Youngkin (R) signed an executive directive that makes it easier to become a teacher, smoothing the path for retired teachers, those with lapsed teaching licenses and, eventually, a variety of people — "career switchers, military veterans and other professionals with much to offer students." The directive also establishes a "teacher occupation apprenticeship" that will let college students in training to be teachers instruct students. And it grants an unspecified amount of "discretionary" funding for teacher recruitment and retention to school districts with the largest, most persistent shortages.

September is Suicide Prevention Month

During this time of the year, we focus on the role we all play in suicide prevention. As school-based mental health providers, we can take this opportunity to highlight the significance of suicide and the importance of reducing the stigma of reaching out for help, knowing how to talk to others about suicidal thoughts, and understanding what resources are available for those in need.

- Help spread the word about 988. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) has added downloadable print files for wallet cards, magnets, and posters to its <u>988 Partner</u> <u>Toolkit</u>. The toolkit already includes <u>logo and brand guidelines</u>, key messages, frequently asked questions, fact sheets (English and Spanish), radio PSA scripts (English and Spanish), and more. The <u>988</u> <u>print materials</u> are available for ordering from the SAMHSA store and social media shareables about the basics of 988 are now available!
- <u>#BeThe1To</u> is the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline's message for National Suicide Prevention Month and beyond, which helps spread the word about actions we can all take to prevent suicide.

- <u>2022 Youth Suicide Prevention Panel Recording</u>: The Virginia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS) within the Office of Child and Family Services decided to shine a spotlight on youth suicide prevention during Children's Mental Health Awareness month in May 2022. The panel discussion provides an overview of the landscape of youth suicide nationally and in Virginia, as well as strategies for suicide prevention in youth and young adults.
- The use of a multi-tiered framework to advance school-based mental health is well supported in the materials and guidance through the <u>Virginia Tiered Systems of Supports</u> (VTSS). The Jed Foundation (JED) has developed <u>The Comprehensive Approach to Mental Health Promotion and Suicide Prevention for High Schools</u>, which is grounded in a tiered framework and aims to reduce reduce risk factors and enhance protective factors for suicide, promote overall health and well-being, highlight effective strategies for identifying, and responding to those at risk.

The Department of Education Releases Back-to-School Checklist for Parents

On Thursday, August 25, the Department of Education (ED) released a back-to-school <u>checklist</u> for parents and families to help caregivers engage with local school and district leaders about how they are supporting students as they recover from the impacts of the pandemic.

"This checklist elevates key evidence-based practices for supporting students' learning and mental health, and ensuring the safety of students and staff, which districts are encouraged to implement using American Rescue Plan (ARP) and other COVID relief funds," ED's **press release** says. In addition, the back-to-school ARP checklist also recognizes 15 examples of how states and school districts across the country are using ARP funds to support students and to staff schools.
